SEMINAR TOPICS

- MLA tools and basic principles: Rogatory letter. Informal assistance. Diplomatic channels. Treaties and multilateral conventions. Administrative Arrangement and Designation. Dual criminality. Confidentiality and Legal threshold.
- Bilateral treaties: Constitutional law and Internal mechanism to treaties and conventions. Central authorities and competent authorities. Request: summary of allegations, text of the offence, description of evidence sought, Time limits and Confidentiality requirements. Incoming and outgoing requests. Refusal of requests.
- Multilateral Conventions: Regional instruments and International Instruments. Requirements of the conventions to State. Harmonizing legal frameworks. Common law tradition vs. Civil law systems.
- Scope of mutual legal assistance: Taking evidence or statements or judicial documents. Executing searches and seizures. Freezing and examining objects and sites. Providing information. Proceeds of crime, etc.
- Extradition, transfer of proceedings and other **matters:** Dual criminality. Protection of nationals.
